

### "ROBOCUP JUNIOR COMPETITION WA 2015" Review

On the 7th of August 2015 the Inspire Academy Lego Robotics team went to Curtin University, Bentley Campus in Perth to compete in the "Robocup Junior Competition WA 2015" against other schools.

The Lego Robotic team built their own robots and programmed them to compete in Rescue or Dance. Every Tuesday Mrs Bennett, leader of the Inspire Academy, had organised the Lego Robotic team to stay behind after school to work on their robots and organised the team to compete in the 'Robocup Junior Competition WA 2015'. A student from Murdoch University, Jacob, helped and taught the Lego Robotic team how to build and program the robots and the Lego Robotic team has enjoyed lacob's company.

The team names who competed in Rescue were "Pendolphquin", "Breath Mint" and "T.J.R". The team names who competed in dance were "Disco Pals" and "Two Dancing Wizards". We all have worked extremely

hard to get our robots done in time for the competition. The Rescue crew had to program their robot to follow the black line through a course, pick up a stranded can and take it to safety and then make the robot do a dance. For Rescue the teams "Pendolphquin" came 23 out of 97, "Breath Mint" came 13 out of 97 and "T.J.R" came 81 out of 97. The Rescue crew did an excellent job for

creating robots and programing their robots to compete in "Robocup Junior Competition WA 2015" and their performance for trying their hardest in the Rescue Competition. Overall Coodanup came 20 out of 70.

The Dance crew had to program their robot to dance to the music they had chosen, while they were dancing, have a costume for the robot and for themselves. The "Two Dancing Wizards" chose to dance to "Magic" by B.O.B and Rivers Cuomo. Their costumes were a black wizard cap, black glasses and black wizard's hat. Their robot had two googly eyes, pipe cleaners and blackish, green cap. The "Two Dancing Wizards" didn't have any props. The "Two Dancing Wizards" came 8th in Secondary Dance out of 30 schools which included Coodanup. Congratulations "Two Dancing Wizards".

"Disco Pals" had chosen to dance to "Just Dance" by Lady Gaga and Colby O'Donis. Their costumes were Black short sleeve shirt, black leggings, one "Disco Pals" wore a gold, glittery bow and the other one wore a silver, glittery bow and hat. Our robot costume was a white, round brim hat and had a gold, glittery bow. The props that we had was a white, 2.4 x 2.4 stand poles with gold and silver stars and we also had a disco ball. We came 3rd in Secondary Dance out of 30 schools. Congratulations "Disco Pals".

One of the "Disco Pals" and one of the "Two Dancing Wizards" had an interview with ABC News after we performed. ABC News aired that night at 7:00pm and we both did a good job. It was a long and exciting day and the Lego Robotic team all did a fantastic performance and we all enjoyed the day.

On the 8th of August, the "Disco Pals" had to go back to Curtin University to compete against the top 7 teams that made it in the

> finals. If you win the finals your team will go to Adelaide to compete for the National State "Robocup Junior Competition WA 2015" on the 27th of September 2015. They had an interview with the judges with our robot, log book and our computer. The judges said they enjoyed their performance and they are keen to see us next year. They set the stage up and did their performance.

"Disco Pals" came 5th place out of 7 schools. Congratulation "Disco Pals".

# Snakes


Year 7 had a surprise visit from some slithering, slimy, scaly snakes earlier this term.

#### Visual Arts News

Senior school students from Years 10, 11 and 12 attended an art exhibition at the Alcoa Mandurah Art Gallery on Friday 7th August and were fortunate to hear one of the practising artists give a Gallery Talk. Susan Flavell talked us through her experience and introduced all the displayed artworks; she referred specifically to the background to her pieces and their fruition. In 2013, she and six other Western Australian artists undertook a residency at the Freud Museum London 'to reconsider Sigmund Freud and his work in relation to his domestic context'. They spent time at the house and home of Freud and were allowed access to areas and possessions not normally shown to the public. "An Internal Difficulty" showcases the artwork produced by the group on their return to Australia. The artists all work in a variety of ways: using photography, sculpture, drawing, ceramics and textile art. The students were excellent in their behaviour during the excursion, and also very mature and respectful as the show has some nudity and potentially controversial content. However they used the event as a thought provoking one and interacted well with both the artist and Gary Aitken, the curator of

the gallery. They asked stimulating questions and were interested in Susan's journey as an artist. As Gary said, "consider yourselves artists, think in a creative way and this will help you in your future". Exposure to both the exhibition and meeting the artists ought to inspire our students and fuel their creativity.
